2017 Dr. Elizabeth W. Thorndike Adirondack Achievement Award Presented to Raymond P. Curran Ray is a professional ecologist, having worked for the Adirondack Park Agency for 31 years before entering the private sector in 2004. He has a varied community activity past, serving as President of Ausable Valley Habitat for Humanity, in the Adirondack Council of the Boy Scouts of America, as a Trustee for the Adirondack Nature Conservancy, and a founding director of Adirondack Sustainable Communities. Recently he served as a volunteer participating with Northern Forest Atlas Project, the Common Ground Alliance – Blueprint for the Blue Line, land use planning with the Town of North Elba, and recreation planning for the Town of Wilmington. The Thorndike Award is given annually to an individual who has demonstrated significant contributions to the long term sustainability of the Adirondack Park through scholarship, research, and policy initiatives. 




Ken Rimany Recognized
